## **President's Corner - Joe Steiner**



The winter blues are starting to set in, and you may be thinking that it's difficult to come up with ways to occupy yourself with music. But there are certainly opportunities for bluegrass entertainment. While it's much easier to find events during the summer, they do also exist during the winter. In addition to indoor festivals and concerts, you may

want to look for jam sessions, even if you're not a picker yourself. These don't hold quite as much interest for listeners, since there is not a dedicated "show" to hold the audience's interest. But it is an opportunity to visit with friends while listening to bluegrass music in the background.

It is fun to watch performers in a jam session – it's a unique opportunity to see them in a different light, when they are coming up with musical ideas completely on the fly rather than in a rehearsed context.

I think it is a good rule of thumb to give an event the benefit of the doubt. If you're not familiar with a particular event or location, just go anyway and look at it as an adventure. Even if you attend only to find that it falls short of your hopes or expectations, you will still have fun and meet friends.

If you play, or are learning to play an instrument yourself, winter is a good time to check out the opportunities jam sessions present. Each jam is a unique experience and sets you up to try your chops in a different environment – this gives you an opportunity to explore your creativity as you get into someone else's groove.

If you are learning to play, sometimes it's difficult to decide whether you are looking for a concert or a jam session. Concerts are a great opportunity to listen, and to be entertained by dedicated performers. But you don't want to underestimate the educational value of getting into a situation where you can pick a little yourself, especially if you are relatively new at playing music.

Jamming with others helps grow an appreciation of the music, and the way the instrumental parts and vocals fit together. This helps you build a comfort level for getting into similar situations in the future. It also makes watching concerts more enjoyable in the future when you understand more about the creativity involved in putting the pieces together.

Especially for younger folks, I think it's prudent to make ways to get out and around to musical events during the winter. The reputation that you build now, as you associate with others in the bluegrass


